“Out of Africa into Malta” – this lunchtime

We hope that as many people as possible will join us after this morning's service – for a bring-and-share lunch (don't worry if you've not brought anything – there's always plenty to go around), followed by a talk about refugees in Malta...

Revd. Joy and Dr. Geoff Levine are Methodist Minister and Cambridge GP respectively, and both regular worshippers at Castle Street. Geoff has a particular interest in diabetes, and they have both worked over the past eleven years with hospitals in the slums of India where Geoff trains doctors. However, on this occasion they will talk about a project with St. Andrew's Church in Valletta, Malta (see www.saintandrewsmalta.com). They have twice visited the refugee camps in Malta at the invitation of the church and have explored the setting up of self-help groups there. This is a particularly critical time to discuss the plight of refugees with so many attempting to enter the EU and the risks to their lives they are taking both overland and at sea. As Christians we are all concerned about our response and this is an opportunity to air some of our thoughts.

This year's takes place this afternoon at 3pm in the Chapel at Addenbrooke's Hospital, and will be led by Revd. Deborah McVey. All are welcome, especially families and friends of those who have died in road accidents in recent months, and those involved in the rescue services. The service will be followed by refreshments.

Living with Differences: Marriage and Relationships – advance notice

Christians have always had to live with differences unless severe repression has been in place. In the twentieth century, British Christians took very different views on pacifism and warfare or on divorce. Today they have conflicting views on same sex relationships. With the sudden introduction of legal same-sex marriage, how does the church cope with different views on such a major subject. How does it affect our view of marriage?

There are to be two circuit consultation evenings as part of a national consultation by the Methodist Church, with Revd. Colin Smith (circuit superintendent minister) and Revd. Carole Irwin (Wesley House) speaking and leading a discussion on this subject. They are to be held on Thursday 3rd December at Histon Methodist Church and on Monday 1st February at Haslingfield Methodist Church, both starting at 7.30pm. (The format for the Histon meeting will be similar to the "Big Issues" evenings, and will include refreshments.)

There will be time to introduce the themes and encourage conversation to provide useful feedback to input into the national consultation process.

Cambridge House of Prayer – more information

A Diocese of Ely initiative, the Cambridge House of Prayer (CAM-HOP) is an open hospitable community of prayer which has been meeting on Thursday evenings since September last year.
