End Hunger UK – petition

End Hunger UK is built on a vision of a society where everyone has access to good food, and no one has to go to bed hungry. It calls on Government to fix Universal Credit to prevent more people going hungry.

We all rely on the welfare safety net being there for us in times of financial stress or hardship. But Universal Credit is currently failing in that task. In areas where Universal Credit has been rolled out, foodbanks and other food aid providers report a surge in the numbers of people pushed into greater debt, destitution and hunger as a result of delays, errors, a lack of flexibility, and inadequate support. As a matter of urgency, End Hunger UK is calling on the government to:

- Take action to improve the flexibility and support for people on Universal Credit.
- Make improvements to Universal Credit, to ensure it does not leave more people at risk of debt and destitution.
- Make a long-term commitment to ensure Universal Credit provides people with enough income to afford good food on a regular basis.

The petition will be delivered to 10 Downing Street in the lead-up to the Autumn Budget in mid-November.

The campaign is being supported by a range of national food and poverty charities including Child Poverty Action Group; Church Action on Poverty; the Church of England; the Food Foundation; the Independent Food Aid Network; Sustain: the alliance for food and farming and the Trussell Trust. “Uprooted” – a new Christian Aid exhibition at Emmanuel

Two-thirds of people around the world who are forced from home are still in their own country. That’s more than forty million people. Seeking safety but unwilling or unable to cross a border, they are largely ignored by the international community and denied the official protection afforded to refugees. But Christian Aid believes that everybody counts.

“Uprooted” is a moving photographic exhibition featuring stories of those displaced in Nigeria, Kenya and Iraq which can be seen at Emmanuel United Reformed Church, Trumpington Street, on Tuesdays to Fridays between 10.30am and 3pm, until the end of August.

Ayuba Azagwu was one of the first to flee his village, so managed to find a property in Maiduguri, northern Nigeria. He’s opened up his home to those who’ve fled violence. Although his house only has nine rooms, he’s sheltered up to a hundred people. Many are from his home village; they fled the destruction Boko Haram brought and arrived in Maiduguri with nothing.

Ayuba is losing rent money, but he feels obliged to help: he said, “They have no-one else to help but me.” He’s not sure if he’ll ever get back to his farm and his old life. The harrowing stories of Boko Haram show us the worst that people can do to one another. But there are also stories like Ayuba’s which reveal the best humanity can be.

Come along to the exhibition and add your voice to those calling for a fairer deal for everyone on the move including Ayuba and those like him. Although the United Nations and its member states are currently working on two new agreements on refugees and migration, neither will tackle the problem of internal displacement.

Christian Aid believes that the world can and must do better.
